MAKING TALLAHASSEE FLORIDA'S FIRST GIGABIT CITY

Success in today's world requires a stronger connection to technology than ever before. From basic research for a school project to sealing international business deals, a fast, reliable and affordable internet connection is crucial. Two important steps were made in 2019 to further these services for Tallahassee residents.

First, the City Commission requested two studies. One looked at municipal broadband networks. The other analyzed fiber optic networks and broadband Internet accessibility in Tallahassee. For the latter, a partnership was formed with a research team from Florida A&M University's School of Business and Industry.

Research sought to analyze the feasibility of using or expanding the City's existing municipal fiber network to provide broadband Internet to residents and businesses. The basis of the discussion was rooted in the perception of a "digital divide," in which a lack of Internet access acts as a social and economic barrier for economically-disadvantaged residents.

Highspeed internet, or broadband, is instrumental for residents as it relates to providing economic opportunity, job creation, education and civic engagement.

While the conversation and research occurred, the Commission acted on the City Manager's recommendation to immediately move the needle and enhance economic development opportunities in this space. The vote to adjust the City's policy for joint use of utility poles opened the door for private utility providers to share space on 9,000 City utility poles, roughly 15 percent of the City's inventory.

This approach proved successful, as MetroNet, a fiber optic telecommunication service provider, announced its intention to expand services to Tallahassee, bringing a planned investment of \$75 million to the Capital City. Recognizing the City's desire to close the digital divide, MetroNet agreed to invest in the Bond, Frenchtown and South City neighborhoods. The company's arrival will make Tallahassee the first Gigabit City in Florida.

DISPOSE OF YARD DEBRIS PROPERLY

Spring is fast approaching, and soon, utility customers will be placing piles of yard debris curbside for collection. Yard debris refers to vegetative fragments like tree trimmings, grass clippings, pine straw and leaves. Residential yard debris is collected at the curb in front of each residence every other week, per the Red/Blue Week schedule.

When disposing of yard debris, place it within three feet of the curb and away from low-hanging wires, trees and other obstacles, such as mailboxes, fences, etc. Clippings and pine straw may be placed in clear bags or boxes. For shrubs and limbs, piles should be no larger than 6 feet long, 4 feet wide and 4 feet high. The maximum size for limbs is 6 feet long and 4 inches in diameter. Place yard waste, bags and bulky items in separate piles for pickup. For more information on how to properly dispose of your yard debris, visit *Talgov.com*.
